SFDC Hosts Discussion of Area Housing Affordability

Last Wednesday evening, about 50 local residents attended a conversation on housing affordability hosted by the Southeast Fairfax Development Corporation. The speakers were Tom Fleetwood, Director of Fairfax County's Department of Housing and Community Development, David Levine, President/CEO of Good Shepherd Housing, and Kyle Talente, Economist/Principal at RKG Associates (and former President of SFDC).

Fleetwood and Levine began from the premise that housing is a platform for family and individual well-being. It benefits the community because appropriate housing leads to better performance at work and school, more potential for upward mobility, and economic growth as more spending money is available.

Talente pointed out that a variety of housing types will allow an in-

All the speakers agreed that rents and home prices have risen faster past several years, and they provided very similar dollar amounts. The average 2015 rent in Fairfax County was \$1,764, requiring an income of \$70,560. Most publicsector workers cannot afford to live here; starting teacher pay is \$47,046, police officers make \$50,264, and public health nurses \$51,254.


Many private sector job salaries are also too low; about 45% of all jobs in the county pay less than \$50,000.

According to Talente, demand is substantially greater than supply for price points up to 80% of Area Median Income (AMI), which is about \$112,000 for a family of four in Fairfax County. All three speakers described the inherent difficulties of building lower-rent housing, as construction and operating costs are the same, but the income stream is less. The deals don't "pencil out."

Talente asserted that the private sector simply cannot build and operate housing at a loss; public sector assistance is required to finance lower-rent housing projects. However, there is a concern that recent Federal tax proposals would eliminate some tax credits and lower the value of others, endangering these financing mechanisms.

Fairfax County has programs to help lower-income residents, including Housing Choice Vouchand county-owned units. In addition, about 3,500 units have been built under the county's rezoning requirements for Affordable and Workforce Dwelling Units (ADU/WDU).

Non-profit housing providers serve various portions of the community. Levine described Good Shepherd Housing (GSH) as providing permanent housing and financial support services for working families earning up to 50% of AMI. GSH currently

ers, First-Time Home Buyers, owns 62 units, and has a goal of adding 150 units in the next several years.

> Many audience members expressed a desire to advocate for additional lower-cost housing. The speakers' consensus was that increasing housing supply overall will help, so citizens can promote higher density rezonings that include ADUs and WDUs.
